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Praying TO THE Father

But you, when you pray, go into your room, and when you have shut your door, pray to your Father who is in the secret place; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly. Matthew 6:6

The way we approach God determines the effectiveness of our prayers. Do we approach God as his sons or as the heathens? The Bible says to many that received Him, to them He gave power to become sons of God, even to them that believe in him (John 1:12). Our faith when we pray should be based on our relationship to the One we are praying to. It is not about where we are praying from or who we are praying with. The woman of Samaria thought that it was 'about the place' but the Lord Jesus told her it's 'about the truth and the spirit.' It is more about your spiritual connection to God.

And when you pray, do not use vain repetitions as the heathen do. For they think that they will be heard for their many words. Matthew 6:7

The Bible says the heathens think they are heard for their much speaking and hence they use vain repetitions. As the sons of God, we are not heard because of the noise, shouting, strong vocabulary or long prayers but because of our relationship with the Father. When we approach God we do it with boldness knowing there is a relationship between us. We are no longer strangers nor foreigners to Him, but members of His household (Eph 2:19). There is nothing new we can bring before God that He doesn't know about us. Why should we spend more time explaining our needs and our situations to Him as if we are talking to a stranger?

In our prayers we should spend more time adoring Him, telling Him how great He is, how loving He is, how caring He is. His promises to us His sons are 'yes and amen' unto His glory by us. (2 Cor 1:20). The Word of God also says, *His divine power has given unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness through the knowledge of Him that has called us to glory and virtue.* We can receive all things from our Father when we have a deeper knowledge and understanding of Him that called us and made us His sons.

The Lord Jesus taught the disciples to pray and the first thing He stated was that they should say "Our Father which art in heaven." In your prayers you must never forget that you are talking to your Father too. He is not a Father to pastors, prophets, elders only, but He is also a Father to you and you have direct access to Him. Christ gave us access according to Ephesians 2:18 *"For through Him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father."* We have an advantage that we have a 'Father which art in heaven.' This means He is in control of everything that is happening there and here. When we pray let's confidently declare that our Father is in charge. Matthew 6:26 *"Behold the fowls of the air, they sow not yet your heavenly Father feeds them, Are you not much better than they?"*

I am much better because I am His son. *"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ who has blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ."* Eph 1:3

In the Bible we have a story of a prodigal Son who went out and did all the bad one could possibly imagine and when things got tough, he decided to go back to his father. When he came back home, he tried to approach his father as a servant, but the father refused and said you are my son and I am going to treat you as such. The father asked his servants to bring him the best robe, to put a ring on his hand, shoes on his feet and kill the fatted cow. Child of God know that you have a loving Father. You can make mistakes but know that the Father still loves you. As you repent, know that you are forgiven and the relationship is restored. You have access, deserve the best and the fatted from your Father. Continue to approach Him as your Father and never as stranger. Let us hallow His name because He is a great and powerful Father. Remember all the power and glory belongs to Him and we do not fear anything. (Matt. 6:13). Our Father never slumbers but watches over us day and night. Don't harm yourself in trying to get access to your Father like the prophets of Baal. No physical actions will convince God to do it for you without faith in Him as your Father.

If you then, being evil know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more shall your father which is in heaven give good gifts to them that ask him. (Matt. 7:11)
